COVID Safety Plan

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Introduction

To our Te Kauwhata Primary School community,

In both 2020 and 2021 we have had Covid-19 related disruption to the school year. Upon reflection, one of the positives that has come out of multiple lockdowns is that we are always ready for Distance Learning and to communicate with you about how we can best support our tamariki. As parents/caregivers you have played such an important role in supporting your children and our school during lockdowns - thank you so much for your efforts and please know we understand how truly challenging it has been.

Back in August of 2021, when a positive case of Covid-19 was discovered in the Auckland community, New Zealand went back into a nationwide lockdown. A colossal collective effort went into setting up our learners for this abrupt absence from school as we started to understand the impact of the Delta variant and what it might mean for us personally and educatively.

Even though it has been tough we should also remember to celebrate the fact children never stop learning - in partnership, we have achieved a lot. There have been many joyous moments to celebrate together.

As we look to another school year and a new variant within New Zealand we will continue to update this plan as guided by the Ministry of Health [MoH] and Ministry of Education [MoE].

Now, we are equipped with a greater knowledge of how to run the school safely and we are committed to doing our part to protect our most vulnerable. With this in mind we would like to share this safety plan with you, as we follow public health recommendations.

A summary of what school will look like under the CPF levels is included at the end of this document so you have a sense of the bigger picture. As the situation evolves we will be adaptive and update this document. In keeping our children, families and selves safe it will require conscientious effort and this safety plan sets the expectations for how we will move forward together.

Vaccination

At this point the best way to protect ourselves and each other from severe infection is to get vaccinated. From January 2nd, 2022 only fully vaccinated staff and support people can be employed by the school to work with children. It is a requirement under the COVID-19 Public Health Response (Vaccinations)

Amendment Order 2022 that all staff receive booster shots and provide this information to the BoT of TKP.

Health and Safety Strategies

TKP follows the health guidelines [MoH] with clear procedures to enable us to operate safely and reduce the spread of Covid-19. These include, staying home if unwell, wearing masks (if at Red level), good ventilation, regular hand washing and physical distancing.

Vaccination

As of January 23rd 2022, Te Kauwhata Community has a 87.3% double vaccination rate [MoH] out of the eligible population. Getting vaccinated is a key step to gain more protection against the virus.

Only a small number (less than 100 people in New Zealand) qualify for a vaccine exemption.

We strongly encourage students who are aged 5 years and up to get vaccinated. The school keeps a vaccination register for staff under strict privacy conditions.

Should we have an exposure in the school, we will act quickly in determining the next steps in protecting and managing others' health and safety. You will find more information in our plan below. The student specific information will not be shared beyond a very small number of school leadership and/or administration teams and only as needed. We respect your rights to privacy and confidentiality.

Health & Safety

Scientists, public health officials and school leaders have learned a lot about what risk mitigation strategies have been most effective in reducing the spread of Covid-19. We are guided by the MoH and MoE and acknowledge that as conditions change so can the guidelines. The TKP Leadership Team will continue to update the community as we act in response.

Protecting Our Vulnerable

Children with complex medical needs

These parents, children and our school leadership team will need to work together to develop plans to support on-site learning for when it is appropriate within the settings of the CPF. Face coverings / Masks

Traffic Light system - Currently at Red

At Red in the traffic light system the MOH guidelines state that all children from Year 4 - 8 need to wear masks at school. Staff and children in Rooms 7, 8, 14, 15, 16 and 17 will be required to wear masks when they are working with students in the classroom or are learning outdoors. Parents will need to supply masks for their children.

Here is the guidelines that our staff are following:

Teachers in Year 4-6 and any member of staff or visitors entering those classrooms will need to wear a mask. Composite classes of Year 3-4 will also need to wear a mask including members of staff and visitors. When entering the public office space staff members will need to wear a mask. Once past the public space though masks can be removed. If a staff member is meeting with or having an interaction with a member of the public or a visitor to the school then they will be required to wear a mask.

Stay Home If You Are Sick

Play it safe. Stay home if you're feeling unwell. Don't come to school and keep unwell children home from school or early childhood education.

If you have symptoms of COVID-19, call Healthline on 0800 358 5453 24 hours a day for advice. Someone will talk with you about your symptoms and arrange for you to be assessed.

Healthline or your general practice team will tell you what you need to do if you need to be tested.

Staff are to observe children on arrival, checking for symptoms. Those who present as unwell will have it arranged to be picked up. Teachers will notify the office.

If a student becomes unwell at school, they will be sent to the office area. The person who receives the child will wear gloves and a mask and place the child in the sick bay. The windows in the sick bay will be open and the school will notify the parents/caregivers to come and pick the child up.

If a teacher becomes unwell at school they will be asked to go home and cover for their class will be organised.

If a child or staff member has been unwell with Covid like symptoms (as per the MOH website

If a staff member is unwell, follow the advice of your GP or Healthline and notify principal @tkp.school.nz of the result of a Covid-19 assessment/test.

Use Basic Hygiene

Wash Hands

Washing hands has been a good strategy in maintaining a healthy environment. To promote good practice we will: Teach good hand washing technique.

- Wash your hands with soap and water often (for at least 20 seconds) and dry
 thoroughly. Use an alcohol-based sanitiser and rub hands together if soap and
 water is unavailable. Encourage hand washing before and after eating, and after
 going to the bathroom Encourage hand washing before and after outdoor play
- Each classroom will have hand washing supplies and hand sanitiser will be available throughout the school
- Coughing or sneezing into your elbow or cover your mouth and nose with tissues. Put them in a bin immediately.

• Avoid touching your face, including your eyes, nose or mouth if your hands are not clean. Surfaces may have infectious droplets.

Cleaning and Disinfection

SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19 has a fragile outer membrane so it only survives on surfaces for a limited amount of time, and it is easy to kill through effective cleaning and disinfection using regular cleaning and disinfecting products.

Daily routine cleaning is managed by our cleaning team to keep the classrooms clean and healthy. However if we are at RED - additional cleaning will take place throughout the day in particular for surfaces touched more during the day and managed by staff. This will be completed by classroom teachers.

We will thoroughly clean items frequently touched like door handles, phones & devices.

Classrooms will have access to detergents and disinfectants.

Surfaces are kept clean and children will be taught to understand and follow good basic hygiene practices.

Should there be a high risk situation (suspected or confirmed case of Covid-19) we would follow MoH guidelines and wait as long as possible before engaging our cleaners to conduct a thorough clean and disinfection process of all concerned surfaces.

Improve Ventilation

During elevated times of Covid transmission we are aware that being outdoors is better. We are recommending that teachers plan to use school outdoor spaces and our environment. We will continue to evaluate risk around the community and balance this as we shift into the CPF.

An additional measure we might take to increase the circulation of air flow:

In prefab buildings - open windows to increase fresh air flow. Prop doors open to promote cross air breeze

New building - outdoor access doors may be propped open to increase airflow

Transportation

With most people living within such a close proximity to school, we expect that in good weather the vast majority of people would come to school by foot, scooter or cycle.

School Buses

Under the CPF Face coverings on school transport will align to public transport requirements. All children from Year 4 and above will need to wear a face mask while travelling on the bus.

Field Trips

• At Orange and Green levels these can take place and we will follow MoH and MoE guidelines.

Physical Distancing

The virus that causes COVID-19 is mostly spread in particles that escape from an infected person's mouth or nose when they breathe, speak, cough, sneeze or sing.

The risk of becoming infected with COVID-19 increases the closer you are to a person and the longer you are close to that person.

The risk is highest in crowded and poorly ventilated indoor spaces, and is lower outside, where there are fewer people, and when you are further away from others.

To **avoid infection**, follow physical social distancing guidelines – by keeping your distance when outside your home:

CPF Settings

- There is not a physical distancing requirement at any of the settings however at RED, keeping 1 metre is recommended between different groups when inside and where practicable
- At RED support for off-site learning will be provided for those advised to remain at home
- At RED protocols to reduce mingling and limit interactions between LC bubbles are in place Please see the summary for key things schools and kura need to know under the CPF below
 - When playing outside we will share the turf time. Years 1-3 at morning tea. Year 4-6 at lunchtime

Contact Tracing Plan

Record your movements. If cases of COVID-19 are confirmed, we need to stop the spread. Keeping a record of your movements helps the Ministry of Health to do contact tracing quickly and efficiently. Contact tracing and case management will continue to be very important with contacts being identified, self-isolating and getting tested.

The NZ COVID Tracer is a Ministry of Health app that supports fast and efficient contact tracing by creating a digital diary of the places you visit. HPP has our QR codes displayed prominently on our main entrances/exits and all staff and essential people on-site need to sign in.

In addition to scanning into the school:

Staff need to keep an accurate attendance register of students in attendance at school (through our SMS system)

Staff, when personal contact details change, ensure administration is updated.

Parents and caregivers, when your contact details change, please email office@TKP.school.nz or phone 07 826 3564 to update your details.

Where hand hygiene, physical distancing, student and staff vaccination and good ventilation has been in place the risk of COVID-19 transmission in school settings is considered low. We will focus on our protocols and maintain vigilance as part of keeping everyone safe. From international evidence we know the greatest risk is adult - adult, and adult - child transmission but this is significantly reduced in settings where vaccination is

high and our other safety measures are in place.

Infectious Case

The school will receive guidance and resources on how to manage an infectious case. It is unlikely we would need to close the whole school, should there be a positive case, however it may be considered if there was a high volume of cases.

The school will liaise with a designated person from the MoE and/or the MoH to risk assess and identify close, casual plus and casual contacts. Emails & letters will be sent to those contacts by the Senior Leadership Team.

The timeliness of our ability to work through the steps below will be determined by a conscientious effort to follow protocol. Contact details, especially emails and phone numbers, need to be up to date within our school system.

Specific information will be shared in the emails to all our community however in summary [MoE & MoH]:

Cases of COVID-19 in a school will continue to be managed across the framework. Schools will work with the Ministry of Education, following public health guidance, to identify who else may need to self-isolate and get tested. Contact tracing systems will support this process. Letter templates and other supports will be provided, to assist with communications to the community.

Closing schools onsite is an unlikely option at all levels of the framework. However, it may be considered where there is a high volume of cases in a school.

Where confirmed cases occur within a school or kura, it may be necessary to group **Year 0 – 8** students by classrooms to limit the risk of transmission. These groups should not intermingle where practicable. There is no fixed limit on the maximum size of classroom groups (for example, one room in a modern learning environment can be considered one group).

All Year 9 to 13 students operate as normal unless public health advice requires stable groupings to be implemented.

Cases in school hostels will be managed directly by public health, as there is a greater risk of spread in a hostel, than there is in a school setting.


