NAG 1: Treaty of Waitangi Policy

Rationale

The Treaty of Waitangi is the founding document of our nation; it provides a framework for partnership, protection and participation between Māori and all other people in New Zealand. The New Zealand Curriculum's vision (p10) states that we want to develop young people who will work to create an Aotearoa New Zealand in which Māori and Pākehā recognise each other as full Treaty partners. Te Kauwhata Primary School accepts its responsibility in endeavouring to fulfill the intent of the Treaty of Waitangi by valuing and reflecting New Zealand's dual cultural heritage, along with upholding the vision of the New Zealand Curriculum.

Purpose

To create a school environment and culture which:

- 1. Recognises and values the unique status of Māori as tangata whenua, the indigenous people of Aotearoa, New Zealand
- 2. Enables and supports Māori students to achieve success as Māori
- 3. Encourages and supports non-Māori students and teachers to engage with and develop an understanding of Te Reo Māori me **ōna** tikanga (Language and culture).

Guidelines

- All students and staff at Te Kauwhata Primary School will have the opportunity to engage with, learn about and practice Te Reo Māori me ōna tikanga through:
 - a. integrating Māori knowledge and understanding, tikanga and reo within our curriculum
 - b. providing Te Reo learning opportunities for both staff and students
 - c. kapa haka development and instruction
- 2. Te Kauwhata Primary School will work to:
 - a. ensure proactive engagement of parents and whānau in making decisions about
 Māori education goals and targets and in the school self-review, vision, values, and curriculum
 - b. Will work to establish a bilingual unit and increase opportunities for students to participate in
 - c. encourage and ensure Māori participation in school governance
 - d. include, in the school charter, our commitment to Cultural Diversity and Te Ao Māori
 - e. observe local tikanga in formal school events, and
 - f. develop sustainable relationships with local hapū
