NMONM Trip to Kelly Tarltons



Ag Day is Coming! Wednesday 15th October

I am so pleased to share that there is a great amount of interest in Ag Day this year. We would love to have more entries. Thank you to those who came along to the Ag Day Demonstration/ Briefing and a huge thank you to Rachael Foy and Loretta Tapp for giving up their time to share their knowledge and experience with our tamariki.

As mentioned in our previous communication, this year, we're aiming to make Ag Day bigger and better than ever, with whole-school involvement and a renewed focus on celebrating this much-loved tradition. As part of this, we will have 'At Home' and 'At School' activities. These will be judged categories where placings will be given. There will be junior (Yr 0-2), intermediate (Yr 3-4) and senior (Yr 5-6) categories for each project.

- Grow a Vegetable and keep a Detailed Journal. A journal template will be provided.
 Depending on practicality, the plant and journal can be brought to school for Ag Day, or a home visit can be arranged.
- Make an A3 Pet Poster with photos and information about your pet. Your pet could be anything from a dog, cat, or bird to a snail, spider, or mouse. Include: name, age, breed, how long you've had it, how you care for it, what it eats, habitat, and any tricks or skills it may have learned. Get creative!
- Make a Miniature Farm using as many natural resources as possible. The farm could be made in a roasting dish or similar container, using materials such as dirt, sawdust, sticks, moss, wood, etc. This can be assembled at home and brought to school, or reassembled at school.

School Board Elections 2025

DHB Guidelines

At Te Kauwhata Primary, we follow the guidelines set by the DHB for sickness. Please see these below for future reference, especially as we have Winter illnesses to reduce the spread as much as possible.

Fever

A fever is a temperature that is higher than 38oC.

A child should not be at school until:

- their temperature has returned to normal (less than 38°C) without needing to use medicine to reduce it, like paracetamol or ibuprofen
- they are feeling well and happy within themselves again.

Vomiting or diarrhoea

Gastro (also known as a tummy bug, rotavirus or norovirus) is an illness caused by an infection in the gut. Symptoms are nausea, vomiting, diarrhoea and fever.

Gastro can spread easily to others, so a child should not be at school if they are vomiting or have diarrhoea.

A child can return to school after 48 hours (2 days) have passed since the last time they vomited or had diarrhoea.

Sore throat

A child should not be at school if they need pain relief for their throat to feel comfortable. Pain relief includes paracetamol or ibuprofen.

School sores and other skin infections

School sores (impetigo) is a common skin infection caused by bacteria. Symptoms are red sores or blisters, which burst to leave crusty, golden-brown patches. The sores can be itchy and mostly affect the face and hands, but they can appear elsewhere.

Other skin infections can also show similar symptoms.

If a child has sores that are red, swollen, oozing, weeping or blistered, or that feel hot to touch, they should not be at school until:

- their sores are covered and healing
- it has been 24 hours since they started antibiotics
- as directed in the guidance for infectious diseases.

Head lice and scabies

Head lice (nits) are common in children because of how close they are together at school. Nits are small insects that lay their eggs on strands of hair. Scratching can be a sign that a child has them.

Children with nits should stay at home from school until treatment has started.

In Term 3 we have:

• One TKP Teacher Only Day for Koroneihana - 5th of September

In 2025, schools are legally required to be open for 193 days. Every year, the Board of Trustees works within the Ministry of Education's guidelines and decides when the school is open for instruction. Teacher-only days are not included in the 193 days, as on teacher-only days the school is closed for instruction.
